We are hired to produce fish, but sometimes we forget as captains we are hired to take people fishing. It is called fishing not catching. I have learned a few things in my career as a Charter Captain. First of all, we are in the entertainment business. Meaning it is our job to make sure our customers have a good experience. Sometimes as captains we get so focused on getting a limit of fish for the customers that the customers are not actually having a good time. Or maybe that was not their intention at all when they hired us. Many times I have had trips and came up short on a limit of fish and yet the customers say it was the best day of their lives on the water. We as captains need to listen to our customers more and just not expect that they are there for a limit of fish. Maybe I am speaking for myself but time and time again I have had happy customers without their limit of fish. With 15-25 mph winds out of the NE and negative tides throughout the day, be prepared to ditch fish if all possible. This means, when the water levels get below normal tide depth, the flats become bare. Most of all of the fish find deep ditches or holes until water has started to come back in and cover back over the flats. If you can find these deep holes during negative tide the fish will be there. A simple soft plastic on a \(\frac{1}{2} \) jig head will do the trick. But be careful and don't always rely on tide charts, winds will make the tide charts lie. Hope to see you on the water, FISH ON!!







One of the most noticeable differences is the shape of their bills. Anhingas have long, pointed bills that are ideal for spearing fish underwater, while cormorants have hooked beaks that help them to grasp and hold onto slippery prey.

Another difference between these birds is their size. Cormorants tend to be slightly larger than anhingas, with wingspans of up to six feet in some cases. They also have longer necks and tails than anhingas do, which gives them a more streamlined appearance when swimming through water. See if you can tell the difference next time you are relaxing by the Steinhatchee River, they are both amazing creatures.


